FATHER MARCUS A. VALENTA was born of a Czech father (Leo William Valenta), who died before he was one year old, and a German mother (Margaret Hermes) at Sweet Home, Texas on June 26, 1905. Being brought up by his German relatives, he did not learn the Czech language. He attended St. Louis College (later called St. Mary's College), San Antonio from 1922 to 1923 and next studied at St. John's Seminary, San Antonio from 1923 to 1926, where he expressed a desire to join the class in Czech, but he was about to continue his studies in Rome, Italy, and Latin of course. He studied at the American College in Rome in 1926 to 1930 and was ordained a priest there on December 21, 1929.

He served as assistant at St. Ann's Church, San Antonio from August 14, 1930 to 1933; next as Chaplain of the "Tree Army" (Civilian Conservation Corps, the C.C.C.) from June 15, 1933 to 1934; next as administrator of Sacred Heart Church, Rockne, Texas July 15, 1934 to 1935; next as administrator of the (Italian) St. Francis di Paula Church, San Antonio from 1935 to 1940. On October 19, 1940 he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force as Chaplain.

Service carried him in the middle of 1941 to Honolulu on Oahu Island, Hawaii, and Canton Island. He lived through the horrors of December 7, 1941 at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii and ministered to the casualties. He saw service at Leyte, Saipan, the Solomon Islands and Okinawa. He was present at the Japanese surrender on August 5, 1945 and served as Chaplain in the Army of Occupation in Japan. He had refused transfer and promotion, in order to stay with the assault troops across the immense combat zones of the Pacific. He served throughout World War II and holds the longest overseas combat-zone record of any Chaplain in the history of the U.S.A. He returned to the U.S.A. on January 3, 1946 and was in the Active Reserves in February 15, 1946.

He served as pastor of St. Philip's Church, El Campo, Texas with mission of St. John at Taiton from April 1, 1946 to 1955 and from then to 1980 as pastor of St. Mary's Church, Praha, Texas, where he sponsored a solemn Armistice Day observance with the cooperation of the Army.

He was a lifetime Chaplain of the Pearl Harbor Survivors' Association and annually promoted the solemn military observance of Veterans Day Service at Praha. The traditional solemn celebration of the parish Feast of the Assumption on August 15 on the actual date, Sunday or weekly attracting thousands of former parishioners and their descendants and friends from far and near.

Rev. Marcus Anthony Valenta died on September 9, 1984 in Houston and is buried in Queen of Peace Cemetery, Sweet Home, Texas. (Short Biographies of Czech and other Priests in Texas, Msgr. Alois Morkovsky, 1982.)

## Czech out all the fun at the TCHCC Heritage Fest & Muziky, October 20-21 in La Grange!

The Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center in La Grange will host the 11th annual *Heritage Fest & Muziky* on October 20th and 21st. The Festival will begin on Friday afternoon in front of the Main Center and TCHCC's famous homemade Chicken & Dumplings will be served while it lasts in the Hanslik Banquet Hall beginning at 5:30 pm. *The KJT Octoberfest on the Deck* will begin at 4:30 pm with music by the *Dujka Brothers* from 6 - 9:30 pm. Mark and John Dujka have been making music together for over 35 years and have several acknowledgements to their name. Bring your lawn chairs but leave your coolers at home, please!

Saturday, the big day kicks off at 10 am with an opening ceremony at 10:30 am. The Hospoda will be filled with cold pivo and musical entertainment by the *Jodie Mikula Orchestra* of Ennis and *Al Sulak & The Country Sounds* of Orchard from 11:00 am to 6 pm. In the Fraternal Mutual Pavilion, enjoy hospitality and music, including a performance by the *Round Top Brass Band* from 11:30A-1P. The Czech Fraternal Organizations will sponsor a variety of fun activities all day in the area. No admission for the grounds and events on Friday evening and Saturday during the day.

Enjoy more music at the *Muziky, Muziky* event from 7-9:30 pm in the Sanford Schmid Amphitheater. Always a popular part of the Heritage Fest, this year's Legends Series continues with a show that is sure to leave a nostalgic glow in your heart! The big finale for 2023 will be the *Bob Wills & His Texas Playboys Tribute* Show, celebrating 90 years! When Texas Playboys front man **Jason Roberts** steps onto a stage with his fiddle and utters his first "Ah-ha" of the evening, western-swing fans know they're seeing and hearing nothing less than the living embodiment of a tradition that stretches all the way back to 1933. That was the year the charismatic fiddler Bob Wills and several other musicians in a group called the Light Crust Doughboys broke away from Fort Worth's Burris Mills and its autocratic business manager, W. Lee "Pappy" O'Daniel, to form their own band. As Bob Wills and His Texas Playboys, they became one of the most popular touring and recording acts in the nation, offering audiences the highly danceable musical mixture that came to be known as western swing.

Presale tickets for the Amphitheater Show are \$20 and are available at the TCHCC Office in La Grange and online at Eventbrite.com from September 1 until Thursday, October 19. Gate admission is \$25. Finishing off the night with a real BANG will be the huge *HEB Fireworks Finale* above the Amphitheater (weather pending).

In addition to enjoying the great music, you're invited to stroll the Czech Village, an early 1900s recreated village complete with residential houses, barns, and stores. Demonstrations of early life for the immigrants will take place throughout the grounds all day, including working in the Zapalac Saw Mill, the operation of the Czech Newspaper Museum press and engine, blacksmithing, corn shelling and grinding, hay pressing, and the making of textiles, soap, noodles, sausage, honey and more. Children activities will be available by the Leo's Club (train ride), KJZT (pumpkin painting) and RVOS along with many other activities for everyone to take part in. The famous SPJST Kolace Eating Contest and the Beer RVOS Tasting Competition are a few favorites.

An antique farm equipment show sponsored by the South Texas Wheel Spinners Crank Twisters Club and an antique/classic car show by H&H Automotive, Schulenburg, will spread through the Czech Village. The Janak Barn & Texas Czech Agricultural Museum displays farm practices and implements from the late 1800s to 1940. There will also be mule drawn wagon rides around the grounds all day! Visit the country store and vendors for some good buys, including fresh, stone-ground corn meal for cooking.

The Czech Village houses two music museums. The Czech Music Museum of Texas, located in the Kalich House, features four genres of Czech music – classical, folk, polka, and liturgical. The Polka Lover's Club of Texas Museum, located in the Hoelscher House & Huebner Center, features a display of Texas polka bands, as well as memorabilia and photos of the Polka Lover's Club of America, Texas Chapter.

Inside the TCHCC Main Center, stop by the Kopecky Gift Shop to browse the brand-new stock of authentic Czech items, T-shirts, caps, crystal, periodicals, music CDs, and new Christmas decorations for 2023. The Hanslik Hall will be the site of the annual *KJT State Taroky Championship*. Swing in there and they'd be happy to teach you this fun card game. The Czech Heritage Society of Texas and US Queens will have displays and be more than happy to visit with you and tell you more about their role in Czech Heritage.

Enjoy the current featured exhibits at the center: *Neighbors Helping Neighbors for Prosperity* in the Museum and the updated Military and Glass Exhibits in the Library. Have you always wondered about your Czech roots? The spacious Melnar Library will offer help with genealogy research.

Plenty to do for the entire family! Come Czech out all the fun and variety you could imagine!

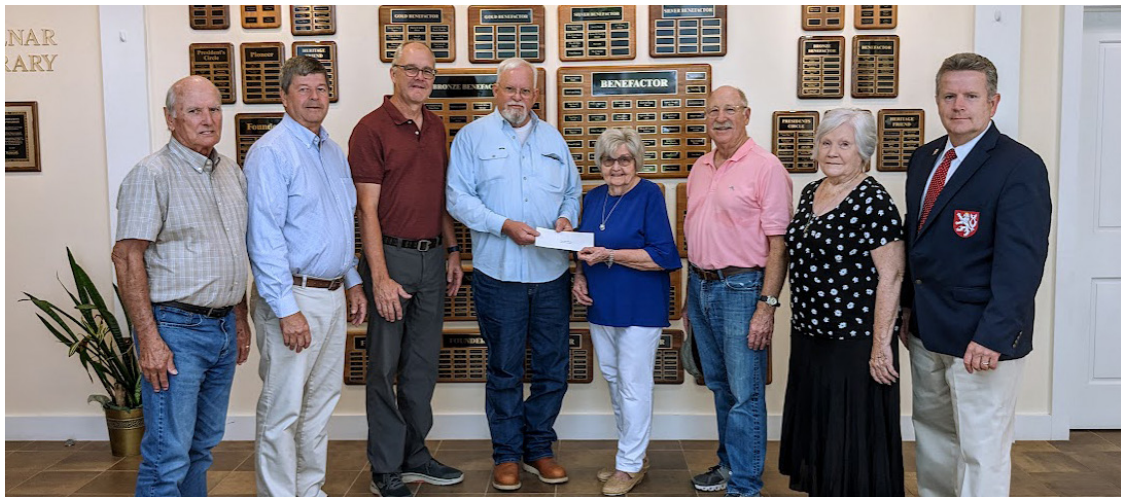

### IMMIGRANT WALL RECOGNITIONS

#### **JOSEPH FILIPP & SON FRANZ AND WIFE BARBARA KLOZIK - PRCHALOV, PŘÍBOR & MNIŠÍ, PŘÍBOR MORAVIA 1875**

Frank Filipp was born in Prchalov, Příbor, Moravia in 1841. He grew to manhood and served in the Austrian Army for almost 11 years. In 1843 he married Barbara Klozik who was born in Mniší. He worked in a cement mill, was a carpenter and a builder but after ten years his father, Joseph, and he decided it was time to set out for a better life in Texas. In 1875 they boarded an overcrowded ship that ran into stormy weather and, after 44 days, arrived in Galveston and first settled in Fayette County.

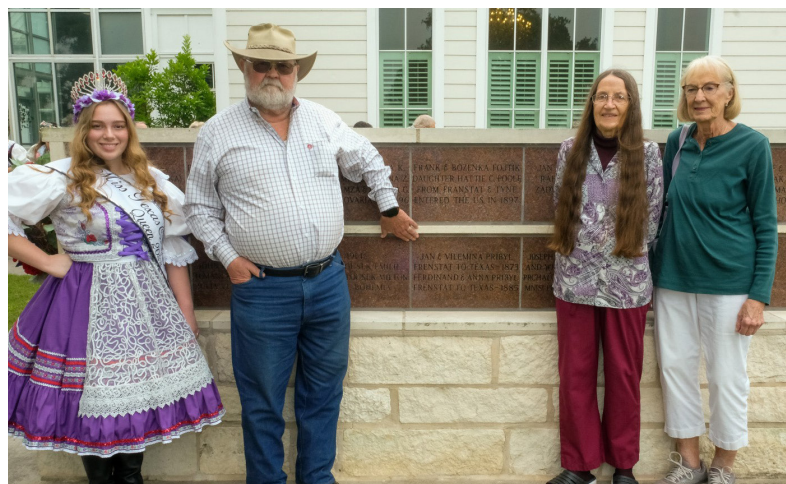

#### **JAN & VILEMINA PRIBYL, FRENŠTÁT TO TX 1873. FERDINAND & ANNA PRIBYL, FRENŠTÁT TO TX 1885.**

The Pribyl Story is unique because it has been fully documented and their story appeared in the Summer 2022 edition of the *Nas Cesky Zivot*.

In 1883, Jan Pribyl, his wife Wilhelmina Bohm and their four children came to Texas from Frenštát. They left their homeland because of hard times, he could no longer profit from his trade as a weaver and sought a better future for his family in America. After years of corresponding by letters, his brother Ferdinand and wife Anna and their son Anton left Frenštát in 1885 and joined his brother and family.

## **Unity of the Brethren**

Unity of the Brethren was first organized in Bohemia in 1457 by the followers of Jan Hus, born 1369 in Husinec. In 1402, he was elected rector of the university in Prague and became the preacher of Bethlehem Chapel. Hus had four pillars to his concept of patriotism. The first was, "Love your neighbor as yourself." His measure of an individual was not based on race or status, but rather upon one's character. The second pillar was his willingness to stand up for what was right, honest and just. The third was seeing every nation as a portion of the whole of humanity, having the right to possess its own land with freedom to conduct its own affairs. The fourth pillar was a compassionate interest in all people, particularly those who are oppressed.

Following Hus's execution for heresy in Contance in 1415, Brethren teaching spread and became the predominate faith in Bohemia and Moravia. Suppression of the Protestant Brethren began during the general European Reformation that was fueled by the teachings of Luther, Calvin, and Knox. When Ferdinand I came to the Austrian throne in 1527, he sought to restore the Roman Catholic Church as the established faith in the Czech lands, causing the first exodus of Brethren.

At the conclusion of the Thirty Years War (1618-1648), one tragic consequence was the complete, legal extinction of the original Unity of the Brethren. After 1620, the Brethren were forced to become either Roman Catholic or go into exile. This ended in 1781, through the Edict of Toleration. This edict dictated that they could become either Lutheran or Reformed (Presbyterian), but they still could not be Brethren. In spite of their suffering, the Brethren never lost hope that one day they would be able to worship as they pleased. It has been reported that 70,000 secret Brethren – the Hidden Seed – soon began to establish congregations throughout the Czech lands.

In the mid-1800s, immigration began from the Czech Lands to America. Among these immigrants was Rev. Ernest Bergman, who arrived in 1849 and was the first Brethren pastor to minister to the steadily increasing numbers of Czech speaking immigrants. In 1886, Rev. Adolf Chlumsky came to Texas and became the father of the Unity of the Brethren Church in Texas and Vice President of the first Synodical Committee. Being one of the pioneer pastors, it was his vision, dedication and special organizational abilities that were largely responsible for laying the foundational stones for the ultimate rebirth of the Ancient Unity of the Brethren on Texas soil.

The following are four early pastors of the Brethren Church in Texas, whose dedication and tenacity are striking examples of the sacrifices made and hardships endured by the early Czech pioneers. These pastors, all cousins, have familial roots in Hodslavice, Moravia and were influenced greatly by Rev. Ernest Bergman.

### **Rev. Joseph Barton**



If there ever was a pastor who suffered much in the course of his ministry, certainly the Rev. Joseph Barton was one. He experienced almost complete blindness in the early years of his ministry and he lost two sons in combat during World War II. Yet he never seemed to feel any bitterness toward God or have any doubts about the validity of his faith.

Rev. Barton was born in Hodslavice, Moravia on September 16, 1886. At the age of fifteen, he confirmed his Christian faith, together with twenty-four other teenagers, six of whom became ministers. Among these was his cousin, Joseph Hegar. After hearing about the renewal of the Ancient Unity of the Brethren on Texas soil in 1903, he immediately became interested in becoming one of its ministers.

At the age of eighteen, Joseph left his homeland and came to America, temporarily settling at West, Texas. Upon the recommendation of his uncle, Jan Hegar, he was formally accepted as a ministerial student of the Unity, along with Joseph Hegar. Soon thereafter, the two headed north to pursue their studies at Elmhurst College in Illinois and later at Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis.



Following his ordination, Rev. Barton became the pastor of four congregations. These were Granger, Taylor, Buckholts and Dime Box. In Granger, he married Miss Albina Mikulencak, who not only became his wife, but also a very important helpmate during his ministry. He helped establish congregations in Robstown, Temple, Houston, Danbury, Midfield, Smithville and at the University of Texas in Austin. In 1935, he became the pastor of the Nelsonville Brethren Church. Rev. Barton assisted in the publication of Bratske Listy ("The Brethren Journal"), served as a member of the Synodical Committee beginning in 1910 and as Vice President of the National Union of Czechoslovak Protestants in America during its convention in Chicago. Rev. Barton died August 28, 1945.

### **Rev. Joseph Hegar**



The Rev. Joseph Hegar was many things to a variety of people, but most definitely he was a friend of the youth. Perhaps his greatest contribution to the Brethren Church in Texas was serving as principal and teacher of the Hus School. It was through the joint efforts with his cousin and brother-in-law, the Rev. Joseph Barton, that this eight-week Christian leadership training course for young people was originally established. It was first held in Granger in 1914 and moved to Temple in 1924. It continues today as part of the Brethren's camp program located at the Hus School Encampment near Caldwell.

Rev. Hegar was born in Hodslavice, Moravia on August 5, 1887. On his fourteenth birthday, his father gave him a special gift of two gold coins with the suggestion that he spend them wisely. He purchased a book entitled The Life and Martyrdom of John Hus, together with some pamphlets on the experiences of the ancient Brethren. After completion of Slavhurst College and seminary studies, he and Rev. Barton were ordained together at the West Brethren Church on July 6, 1910.

Rev. Hegar's first two congregations were West and Ennis. He then added, Mt. Calm, Tioga, Crockett, Dime Box, Buckholts and Cooks Point. The rigors of so much travel resulted in a relapse of typhoid fever. Because of Rev. Hegar's fragile health and insufficient income, he left the ministry and enrolled at the University of Texas for a teaching certificate. He taught from 1918 to 1924, when the Temple congregation called him as pastor and the Hus School moved to Temple. Rev. Hegar died on May 2, 1948.

### **Rev. Frank H. Horak**



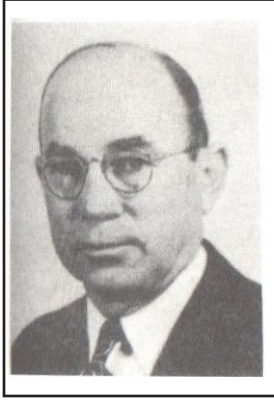
Rev. Frank H. Horak, born March 26, 1892 on a farm near West, Texas, was the first native son of the Unity of the Brethren in Texas to be ordained as a pastor in the West Brethren Church on July 6, 1918. It was Rev. Henry Juren, President of the first Synodical Committee, who led the ordination, assisted by Rev. Joseph Barton.

Rev. Horak received his college education at Elmhurst College in Illinois, graduating in 1915. He then went to Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis where he completed his studies in 1918. He was called to serve the congregations of Cooks Point, Dime Box and Snook, and later expanded to serve congregations in Alief, Rosenberg and Caldwell. Through the years he also served the congregations in Buckholts, Rosebud, Blessing, Danbury, Crosby and Houston.

Perhaps one of the most significant contributions to the long-term well-being of the Brethren Church was his diligence in leading the effort to purchase the Wedemeyer Academy in Temple. It was this building which served for many years as the home of the Hus School. Rev. Horak married Katherine Wirtel on September 17, 1919. He retired from the Brethren Church on February 14, 1936 due to failing health, but continued his ministry in the Evangelical and Reformed Church (now United Church of Christ) in La Grange and Robinson. He died April 19, 1953.



## Rev. Henry Ernest Beseda, Sr.



The Rev. Henry E. Beseda, Sr. was born January 7, 1888, on a farm near West, Texas. His mother brought him to be baptized by the Rev. Henry Juren of the Czech Moravian Brethren Church of West, Texas. She told the minister she was dedicating her son to the Lord's work. Henry received his Bachelor of Arts degree at the University of Pittsburgh. While at the University of Pittsburgh, he responded to his call to be a minister and proceeded to study at Western Theological Seminary in Pittsburgh from 1908 to 1910. For his senior year, he transferred to the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Austin, Texas. He was ordained on June 18, 1911 in the Penelope Presbyterian Church by the Waco Presbytery. In August, 1911, he married the former Miss Julia Chernosky, a well-educated young lady. Rev. Beseda's first pastorage was the little Czech Presbyterian

Church at Six-Mile, near Port Lavaca, Texas. During 1922, Rev. Beseda served as Interim Pastor at Sinton, Texas. From 1923 to 1926, he was Pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Robstown. Then, in 1926, the Besedas moved to Alice, Texas, where their ninth child was born. Rev. Beseda loved this rugged frontier country with its staunch townspeople, farmers and ranchers. In particular, he enjoyed his visits to the nearby great King Ranch.

In 1928 he accepted a call to the Hunter Memorial Presbyterian Church at Holdenville, Oklahoma. Here he contracted malaria and other health complications, and his doctors advised him to return to Texas to be near his relatives. He became the Pastor at the English and Czech Presbyterian Church at West, Texas. In 1937, Rev. Beseda was invited to join the ranks of the Czech Moravian Brethren Church in Texas. The Brethren Church maintained a close relationship with the Presbyterians and many of its pastors received their training at the Austin Seminary. The family moved to Caldwell, where he served as full or part time Pastor of Brethren Churches at Caldwell, Cooks Point, Dime Box, Wesley, Snook, Industry, Fayetteville, Alief, Smithville, Buckholts, Crosby, Houston, Rosenberg, New Tabor, and Pasadena.

In 1957, upon his partial retirement Rev. Beseda wrote, "In journeyings oft, in labors abundant - 45 years! It seems but a moment in the pages of history. Yet it is long enough to plant a seed that shall produce fruit for centuries to come; long enough to kindle a light that shall shine far into regions of darkness and brighten a path for generations yet unborn."

In late 1958, Rev. Beseda suffered a heart attack followed by a major stroke that left him paralyzed. He passed away on May 8, 1959, and was buried where the pulpit once stood at the little chapel at the Brethren Church Cemetery at Cooks Point, Texas.

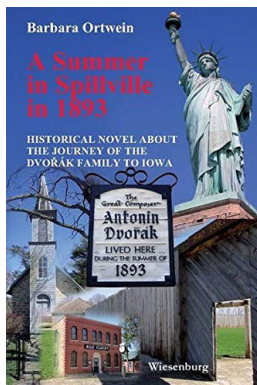

## ***Patricia “Patty” Sulak Kolar***

***November 19, 1943/May 18, 2023***

Patricia Kolar passed away on May 18, 2023 after a decades long battle with Parkinson’s disease. She was 79 years old. Patty was born November 19, 1943 to Josephine Maresh and Albin Sulak in West, Texas.

Patty earned a Bachelor’s in English and completed graduate coursework at the University of Texas and worked as a school teacher for many years. She started her career at O’Henry Junior High, and then taught at Waco University High School while Roger served in the Air Force in Vietnam. When Roger returned and they moved back to Austin, Patty became the Journalism teacher at Johnston High School and then Lanier High School where she sponsored the school yearbook and newspaper. She later worked in research and editing for a textbook publisher. Patty was an avid reader and student of the written word who had a vast knowledge of literature, poetry, and theater.

While Parkinson’s made life progressively more difficult for Patty as the years went on, she lived a full life and never let her disease define her. Patty first started experiencing symptoms of Parkinson’s just weeks before she and Roger traveled to Honduras to finalize the adoption of two of their children. The following year, with four children and a fifth on the way, the diagnosis was confirmed. Patty continued doing the things she loved: raising her family, staying involved in the Czech community, working, and traveling.



## ***Roger Kolar***

***February 20, 1944/May 21, 2023***

Roger Kolar, 79, passed away on May 21, 2023 from cancer. He was born on February 20, 1944 to Hattie (Matus) and Henry Kolar and raised in West, Texas. It was in his first grade classroom in West where he met Patricia (Patty) Kolar, his wife of nearly 56 years. Roger loved and cared for Patty throughout her long battle with Parkinson’s disease. Tragically, and romantically, their diseases progressed side by side in the last year and Patty passed away three days prior to Roger’s death.

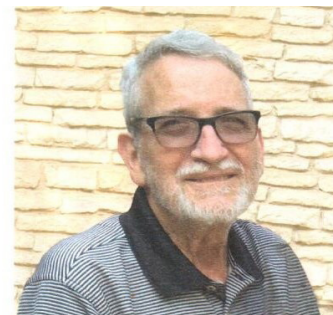
Roger attended SMU earning a degree in Interior Design. Upon graduation, Roger joined the Air Force as an Officer through ROTC. He served in Rapid City, South Dakota, Alexandria, Louisiana, and in Vietnam at the Tan Son Nhut Air Base in Saigon. While in Saigon, Roger was wounded and earned a Purple Heart. He also received a Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service while in Vietnam. Roger was managing partner at several architecture partnerships until his retirement in 2013 from Negrete and Kolar Architects. As a proud Czech, a highlight of his career, was designing the Main Center building for the Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center in La Grange, Texas.

Roger and Patty were longtime members of the University Catholic Center where they taught first grade Sunday school for many years. They were also members of St. Austin’s Catholic Parish, and Emmaus Catholic Church in Lakeway and were both passionate about supporting organizations devoted to bettering the world and caring for those in need.

Roger loved to cook and enjoyed hosting annual Christmas feasts for family and friends. Travel was a large source of pleasure for Roger and Patty, and they made many trips to Europe, Mexico, and Asia over the years. He was a talented artist; his artwork now fills his children’s homes.

He was immensely proud of his five children Susan (Bill) Bohn, Stephen (Margaret) Kolar, Emily (Sara) Kolar, Anthony Kolar, and John (Jaclyn) Kolar. He was an engaged and involved parent, serving as coach, PTA president, and fan for all of his kids at their sports events, shows, and programs. For the last 15 years he took great joy in being Granddad to his seven grandchildren, Brice, Brooks, Izzy, Alex, Miles, Miklas, and Olina. In addition to his children and grandchildren Roger is survived by his siblings Geraldine (Ervin) Laubert, and David (Rebecca) Kolar and their families.

Roger and Patty Kolar are buried in St. Mary’s Catholic Cemetery, West, Texas.

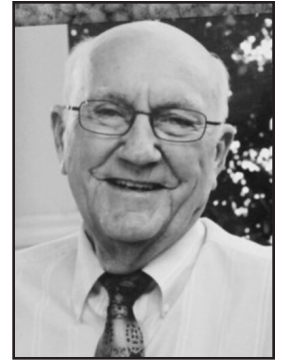




## ***Ed Krivacka***

***August 29, 1935/May 26, 2023***

Eddie A. (Ed) Krivacka died in La Grange, Texas, on May 26, 2023, at the age of 87. The third son of William (Bill) and Annie Vaclavik Krivacka, he was born on a tenant farm near Latium, southwest of Brenham, Texas, on August 29, 1935. Ed's family moved to the Rek Hill community near Fayetteville when he was a small child and he started first grade at the parochial school in town. After graduating from Fayetteville High School in 1952, he went on to earn a Bachelor's Degree in agriculture and a teacher's certificate from Texas A & I University in Kingsville, Texas. Following his graduation in 1956, Ed joined the U.S. Army to fulfill his deferred two-year draft obligation. During the Cold War, he served at an Army Nike site that was part of the U.S. nuclear attack strategic defense system near Detroit, Michigan. While home on leave, Ed met Edna Mae Jasek at a Fayetteville dance. They were married on May 24, 1959, at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Ellinger.



Ed taught in Hallettsville and later in Eagle Lake. After earning his Master of Education degree with all-level administrator certification from the University of Houston while teaching, he applied and was hired as superintendent of Eagle Lake Independent School District. Ed, one of the youngest superintendents in Texas at the time, capably led the district's schools and communities through the desegregation era.

During Ed's tenure as superintendent, Rock Island and Sheridan ISDs were annexed to Eagle Lake ISD and a new independent school district, Rice Consolidated, was created. A large, modern high school, Rice Consolidated, opened in 1971 in the middle of the new district at Altair.

When Ed retired as superintendent, he and Edna Mae moved back to Fayette County, settling in La Grange. He operated a snack food business and managed an apartment complex for some years. Ed also served on La Grange City Council for seven years. He also found time to serve as a TCHCC Board Member.

Ed is survived by Edna Mae, his wife of 64 years; granddaughter, Samantha Younger and her husband, Kyle Younger, and their son Colter; and grandson, Ethan Krivacka; as well as nieces, nephews, family, and friends. Ed's pal, his dog, Tucker, also survives. Ed was predeceased by his son, Mark, mother and father, and brothers: Jerome and Charles. His service were held on Friday, June 9th, 2023 at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Fayetteville, Texas. A private internment will follow.

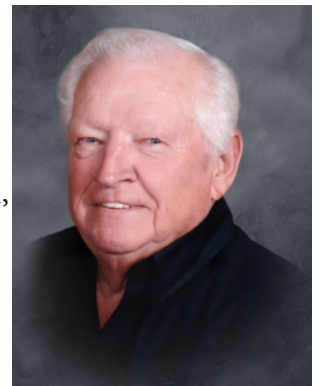
## ***Rudy Patek***
