We began in a one-room office in 1997 and then moved to the Kalich House in 2001 that was restored by volunteers. It became a Visitors Center, Office, and Gift Shop. In 2009, we moved into the Main Building. Now we have a large campus with the Main Building that includes a museum exhibit hall, library, gift shop and banquet hall. Surrounding the Main Building is the Czech Village. It has restored vintage buildings with displays of artifacts owned and used by our early ancestors.

Not only was this year's Slavnost celebrating 25 years since inception, but it was the 20th Anniversary of Slavnost/Mayfest.

I want to thank everyone who has helped us in any way to thrive and grow throughout the years. We could not have done it without our dedicated volunteers and those who supported us financially.

Daniel J. Marek, 92, of El Campo, passed away June 27, 2022. He was born on July 21, 1929 in Shiner to the late John and Rosie Stavinoha Marek. Daniel was a U.S. Army and Air Force Reserve Veteran. He was a member of TCHCC, Wharton County Czech Heritage Society, K.J.T., an honorary life member of Knights of Columbus Council 2490, Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus Council 1131, American Legion Post #251, Texas Retired Teachers Association, TOCA, CEFT, TAMIC, NAMIC, Catholic Life, AARP, Active Advantage and Taiton Community Center.

He is survived by his children, Diana Orsak [Thomas] of Bay City, Dennis Marek [Jan] of Sugar Land, Kenneth Marek [Clara] of Edna, Donna Barrett [David] of Bay City and Nancy McLain [Daniel] of Lake Jackson; 14 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren and 3 great-great grandchildren; brothers Marvin Marek [Judy], Raymond Marek [Ethel], sister-in-law, Josie Mican and brother-in-law, Jerome Bartos [Betty].

Daniel was preceded in death by his parents; wife, Martha Bartos Marek; in-laws, Joe and Annie Spurny Bartos; daughter, Annette Matula; son-in-law, Allen Naiser; brothers, John and Robert Marek and sister, Marie Luchak.

The funeral was held on Friday, July 1 at St. Philip Catholic Church with a KC Rosary recited at 9:30 a.m. Funeral Mass followed at 10 a.m. with the Rev. Michael Rother officiating. Entombment with military honors under the auspices of the American Legion Post 251 followed at Holy Cross Memorial Park.

Daniel was a close, personal friend of all TCHCC volunteers and personnel and a staunch supporter of TCHCC having been on the Board of Directors and physically helping out along the way. He was a recipient of the Czernin Palace Memorial Award in 2014 (pictured above) which was bestowed on him by the Czech Republic and presented to him by the Czech Consul General Raymond Snokhous. He received this award for his many years of dedicated service to all the major Czech organizations in Texas. All Texas Czechs have benefited from the work that Daniel and his wife Martha did throughout the years to preserve and promote the Czech heritage and culture.



Brass-band music has a long tradition at the Pardubice Conservatory. It has been a part of the Brass Department for almost as long as the Conservatory has existed, representing it at many events in the region. In 2012, the Banda di Feste ensemble was founded. In the beginning, it focused exclusively on classical Czech brass music. As time went on, it began to play dance and popular music, so there wasn't as much room for brass band music in the band's repertoire anymore. Therefore, Banda di Feste eventually split into two separate ensembles, a big band and a brass band bearing the name of "Pardubická Muzika".

The new band honours the traditional Czech line-up - two clarinets, two flugelhorns, two bass flugelhorns, two trumpets, trombóne, tuba, and drums. The band also has two amazing singers. The band is led by Michal Chmelař, the first trumpet of the Pardubice Chamber Philharmonic Orchestra.



The Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center, Inc. was incorporated on March 24, 1997 after many years of planning and meetings and was the brainchild of the Texans of Czech Ancestry (TOCA). TOCA is a coalition of representatives of Texas Czech founded organizations that were initially founded in 1985 to celebrate the Texas Sesquicentennial by presenting to the public aspects of Czech history and culture and the contributions made by Czechs in the growth in Texas.

In 1995, TOCA officers were chosen with Retta Slavik Chandler as President, Carolyn Sumbera Heinsohn as Secretary, and Arnold Pechal as Treasurer with the purpose of building a site to celebrate Czech heritage.

The next phase was to choose a site for TCHCC to call home and after selecting La Grange, fund raising began. A Capital Campaign was launched and interested individuals, businesses and other non-profit organizations were invited to contribute \$1,000 to the Million Dollar Club to provide seed money. The response was overwhelming and the funds gave the organization the green light to proceed.

Twenty five years later, the 20 plus acres includes an amphitheater, barns, vintage homes, saw mill, museums, library, and hall rental buildings providing the public with a cultural center that emphasizes the Czech history, language, heritage, and culture. And more is on the way including a Blacksmith Shop and two churches.

THE 25 YEAR PROGRESS OF TCHCC

1996 TCHCC initially begun by TOCA and operated out of desk housed in the La Grange Chamber of Commerce.

1996 TCHCC moved to a one-room office in the BEFCO building in La Grange.

1997 TCHCC signed the lease with the City of La Grange for the property next to the Fairgrounds.

1998 The Walking Trail and Stations were built around the property.

2000 The Kalich House, donated by Jonathan and Peggy Kalich of Schulenburg, was donated to TCHCC in memory of the Kalich Family of Ammannsville. The house was moved to the site by Kana Brothers House Leveling and Moving Inc. and restored by volunteers and a \$50,000 Heritage Building Fund. It was restored by Robert Slovak of Slovak Construction, Ennis, Texas and volunteers under the direction of Marvin Marek. Thousands of hours were spent restoring the dog-run house into a single structure. The Open House was held on October 21, 2001 and served as the official Visitors' Center until 2009.

In 2012 the Kalich House's four rooms were converted into the Czech Music Museum of Texas.

2002 Sanford Schmid Amphitheater was completed. The open air, state-of-the-art theater sits in a natural cove on the hillside overlooking a 60-mile vista including La Grange and the Colorado River Valley. The amphitheater seats 425 people and is built in a Texas Czech style which includes an open stage, dressing rooms, rest rooms and prop storage area. The construction was made possible by grants from the LCRA, Mr. Sanford Schmid, Union Pacific, Leo Legler Estate, as well as individual donors.

2003 The Wallachian Bell and Belfry arrived at TCHCC. The Bell and Belfry began as an idea in September of 1992 when a group of historians and performers from the Wallachian Open Air Museum in Roznov pod Radhostem visited Texas as guests of the Czech Heritage Society of Texas. In 1995 the Bell and Belfry was on display in Washington, D. C. at the Festival of the American Folk Life and after the festival ended the belfry was dismantled and brought to Texas on a rental truck by Eugene Labay and Ladislav Zezula where it sat in Mr. Zezula's barn in Runge for 14 months before being reassembled at its temporary location at St. Mary's Church in Praha, Texas. In June of 2003 CHS of Texas donated the Belfry to TCHCC where it came to its permanent location on July 5, 2003. The Donor Wall was installed next to the belfry during the week of August 17, 2003. The signage documents donors who have given memorials to help provide maintenance and upkeep of the structure. The Fort Bend Chapter of the Czech Heritage Society of Texas added the concrete walkway in 2010.

2004 The Migl House was moved to the site in the Spring of 2004 after being completely restored by the Migl family. The house was constructed in 1890 and lived in by several generations of Migls and Jaseks.

2004 Frank J. Parma Bridge "Mostek" was built across a small stream by Charles Chandler, Dan Marek, Raymond Matthijetz, Johnnie Polasek, Ed Vasek, and Elmont Vyvial. Funding was provided by Patricia Parma in memory of her husband Frank J. Parma.

2005 Log Barn. An authentic circa 1904 Double Log Corn Crib with Dog Trot was donated by Hilda Fajkus and Sylvia Ratcliffe of Cistern and moved to the site by Kana Brothers Moving Company after being restored by Vasek brothers Ed, Ernest and David of Plum, Texas. Restoration took over a year and was completed by logs donated by Jeb Pape. Vickie Matocha donated antique hewn logs and other antique wood.

2005 The Country Store was donated by Roy Bucek and was moved to TCHCC on May 11, 2005. It once stood in Schulenburg. After three years and many volunteer hours of restoration it became part of the Czech Village. In 2010 an addition was added to the side of the store which increased display space. The volunteer carpenters included Ben Bohuslav, Charles Chandler, Waymond Davis, J. G. Hrcic, Ted Kaspar, Charlie Ripper, and Johnnie Polasek.

2005 The Hoelscher Haus, donated by Henry and Esther Hoelscher, was moved to the site on October 19, 2005. The house was built in the late 1870s by the Anton Hoelscher, II Family. The restoration was realized through contributions made by Charter Members of the Polka Lovers Club of Texas and others and houses the Polka Lovers' Club of Texas Museum. The museum honored Msgr. Joseph M. Hybner on February 28, 2016 with the ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for the addition to the Hoelscher Haus. Major donors recognized were Msgr. Joseph M. Hybner and Sanford Schmid.

2007 TCHCC received the *Gratias Agit Award* in Prague, Czech Republic for its contribution for preserving and promoting Czech culture in the U. S.

2008 The Hlucanek Salas (Salač) House, located in Holman, Texas was donated by Don and Betsy Chovanec and was moved to its present location in the village in May of 2008. The two-story house was built by Frank F. Hluchanek in 1889 with additions made in 1915 by the Hluchanek Family.

2009 Library Museum Archives Complex was constructed in 2008. Designer Roger Kolar using a "dvur" courtyard concept, the building is reminiscent of the homes, farm buildings and meeting halls that early Czech settlers built. There is an exhibit museum room that was completed in 2014 funded by Liberty Pollard, The Schwartz Family, and Richard and Molly Cernosek. A library room that was funded by Bill and Betty Melnar contains books and periodicals focused on genealogy, Czech and Texas history and culture. A multipurpose room for meetings and special events was funded by Adolph Hanslik. The board room was funded by KJT, and a gift shop was funded by Willie and Mardi Kopecky. The foyer is a large glassed-in area with a futuristic look funded by Ben and Doris Koliba.

2010 The Immigrant Wall was added and dedicated to Czechs who emigrated to Texas.

2014 Krasna School Bell was donated in 2011 by Raymond and Clarice Snokhous and dedicated in 2014.

2014 Janak Barn is a replica of an early 1900s Texas Czech farm housing the Texas Czech Agriculture Museum. Major donors were Rita Hybner Janak, Sanford & Mannie Schmid, and the Economic Development Corporation of the City of La Grange.

2015 Maintenance Building was built to house all of the display and groundskeeping equipment thanks to the donation and continuous support of TCHCC by Richard and Molly Cernosek and their children Bailey Steinhauer, Chris, Carmen and Lisa Cernosek.

2015 **Zapalac Sawmill** is an 1895 DeLoach No. 1 Mill that was owned and operated by the Vinc B. Zapalac family from the Ellinger area on the Colorado River. Donors were Donna Zapalac Mueller with a partnership from Dickson-Allen Foundation of Hallettsville, Texas. Installation of the mill and making it operational for demonstrations requires intensive, hard work from volunteers from the South Texas Wheel Spinners and Crank Twisters Club.

2016 **Sladek Smoke and Wash House** were added in 2016. Walt Walicek assembled the building that was donated by the children of Erwin A. and Frances Sladek, Sr.: Erwin A. and Bonnie Sladek, Jr., Dr. Tim and Tami Sladek, Brian and Shirley Sladek Varner and Keith and Patricia Sladek Korenek.

2018 **SPJST Lodge #19 Velehrad** in Lavaca County, Texas was moved to the grounds of TCHCC in 2017. The hall traveled through the community of Praha on November 9, 2017 and joined the other TCHCC Village buildings. Kana Brothers, Inc. House Leveling and Moving performed the task. Repairs began and a Dedication Ceremony was held on May 19, 2019.

2019 **The Czech Newspaper Museum** was dedicated in March 2019. The Kluge Printing Press and printing equipment that made its way from Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 2003 was owned by the Jan Barta Letovsky family. Jan founded the first weekly Czech language newspaper in 1869. It was passed down to John Albert Kuba around 1997. In 2003 Adolph Novy of Ennis, Texas transported it to Ennis where he restored it and then transported it to La Grange, Texas. Through funding by Richard and Molly Cernosek, Sanford Schmid and Armin & Regina Keilers the building that was to house the press was completed and dedicated on March 16, 2019.

2022 **The New Archive Storage Building** was completed. Content work has begun and continues.

CURRENTLY. Work on the Blacksmith Shop and a remodel of the Country Store has begun. Two churches, one Catholic and one Czech Brethren, will be completed in the near future.

During her reign, Lauren traveled to seven states, in addition to Texas, to attend cultural events and festivals, meeting with many Czech-Slovak dignitaries. Lauren, an Abbott native, is a member of the McLennan-Hill Chapter of CHS, KJZT Family Life Society #104 Abbott, and SPJST Lodge #66 Waco.

Madison Murphy, CHS Miss Texas Czech-Slovak 2021-22, competed in the pageant alongside state queens from Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and South Dakota. She was welcomed by a host of supporters from the State of Texas, all her family, and Kathy Podsednik, CHS Miss Texas Czech-Slovak Pageant Director. Madison traveled throughout Texas and other states with her title at many festivals and events, making many new friends along the way. Madison is a senior at Abbott High School and is also a member of McLennan-Hill CHS, KJZT Family Life Society #104 Abbott, and SPJST Lodge #6 Cottonwood.

As visiting royalty, Destiny Hollingsworth, CHS Miss Texas Czech-Slovak Queen 2022-23 and a member of Bexar County CHS from San Antonio, participated in bandstand introductions, daily parades, and onstage introductions. All the queens and visitors forged relationships with Czech and Slovak attendees, as well as honorary consuls, dignitaries, and embassy representatives from various states.

During the competition, Madison modeled her personally hand-made kroj of Czech imported fabrics honoring her ancestral homeland. Her talent presentation included her love of quilting, especially from family fabrics. In recognition of her heritage representation, Madison was honored to receive the Gruntorad-Stastny Heritage Award. The \$450 award was accompanied by Bohemian crystal and was sponsored by donors from Canada, Iowa, and Colorado. She was also awarded the Miss Congeniality Award, receiving a scholarship and Bohemian crystal sponsored by the Czech Alaska Society and Peter Ptak. Monica Pechous, a practicing attorney from Missouri, was crowned Miss Czech-Slovak US 2022-23; Anna Sedivy-Thompson, Miss Oklahoma C-S as first runner-up; and Cecelia Minchow, Miss Nebraska C-S as second runner-up.

Letters in Chronicling Migration and Integration
Book Review – Dr. Eva Eckert



In 1883 Jan Pribyl, his wife Wilhelmina, and their four children immigrated to central Texas from Frenstat in the Moravian region of the Austrian Empire. He had lost his income as a weaver and in describing his decision, Jan later wrote from America that, “I have not immigrated out of carelessness but due to certain principles and after sound and mature reasoning and deliberation in order to establish a better future not necessarily for myself but for my posterity.” In 1885 his brother Ferdinand, wife Anna and their son, Anton, also immigrated, settling near Jan.

The story of Jan and Ferdinand has been preserved in the form of over 200 letters written between the brothers and their friends and relatives. These have been passed down through four generations by family members. Most were written in the interim after Jan came to Texas, while Ferdinand was still in Austria. Eloquently expressed, they paint a vivid depiction of life on both sides of the Atlantic during that pivotal era in world history. From Ferdinand’s perspective they describe the difficulties of procuring a life sustaining salary in Europe and on Jan’s side the equal difficulties of establishing roots and procuring an income for his family in a totally new, untested and unknown country.

A further legacy preserved by the family is the artwork of Ferdinand, who painted impressive nativity scenes after he emigrated. These have been displayed in numerous exhibitions, including Christmas exhibits at the TCHCC in 2010 and 2011.

The letters of Jan and Ferdinand are the subject of an upcoming book by Dr. Eva Eckert, a professor of linguistics at the American Anglo University in Prague. In 1990 Eva was teaching at Trinity University in San Antonio when a colleague asked her help in deciphering Czech tombstone inscriptions in the Praha cemetery for a research project. During subsequent visits to other such cemeteries, Eva became fascinated with the determination and tenacity of the immigrants who decided to leave a settled life in usually quite picturesque settings in Europe to move to an unknown land with an often hostile climate. “The contrasts between the geography, architecture and history of the Czech Republic and Texas seemed irreconcilable to me”, Eva wrote. Hoping to answer this question, she visited numerous Czech cemeteries, finding clues to the lives of the people buried there. She also met with descendants of those immigrants, many of whom generously shared their family letters. Her research on those immigrants, using previously untapped and unpublished sources, has been recounted in her book, *Stones on the Prairie*, which is also a detailed history of Czech immigration to the US before World War II.

After reading the book, Bette Stockbauer, a descendant of the Pribyl family, contacted Eva and shared with her the Pribyl letters. Impressed by their depth of feeling and the compelling picture they paint of the immigrant experience, Eva has used them as the subject for a book soon to be published by Slavica Publishers called *Letters in Chronicling Migration and Integration*. During the era it describes, letters were the only means of maintaining contact between the members of separated families, many of whom would never see one another again. They were vital in relaying news and often deeply moving. Dr. Eckert does a brilliant job of not only telling the story of Jan and Ferdinand, but in showing their experience as a reflection of the lives of millions of others who held the same aspirations and faced the same challenges.



The Life and Sojourn in Texas of Reverend Bohumír Gottfried Menzel Presentation at TCHCC

The Life and Sojourn in Texas of Rev. Bohumír Menzel was presented at TCHCC on August 25, 2022 by Dr. Lukas Perutka from Rožnov pod Radhoštěm, Czech Republic.

Dr. Perutka has a PhD in History, is a 2012 graduate of Charles University, Prague and has focused on migration from Valachia to Texas since 2015. His teaching experience includes courses taught at U. C. Berkley and Tecnológico de Monterrey, Mexico. He is currently back in the Czech Republic teaching World History and Czech Migration at Charles University and is also an assistant professor at Palacký University in Olomouc.

Bohumír (Gottfried) Menzel was born on June 6, 1798 in Krasny Les in northern Bohemia to a farming family. He was somewhat of a mysterious figure who visited Texas between 1849 and 1851 with a group of German and Czech settlers. He settled in the New Braunfels, Fredericksburg, Castroville, and D'Hanns areas where he taught school, was a natural scientist, and a Catholic priest.

Dr. Lukas Perutka has studied his life and is preparing a paper detailing his career. Perutka informed the TCHCC attendants that "Menzel's first intention was his passion for natural sciences, and his desire to discover unknown flora and fauna in Texas. He was very likely influenced by his friend August Corda, who was invited by count Franz Colloredo Mansfeld to participate in a biological expedition to North America in 1848... His second reason was the fact that Menzel served as a guide of Czech and German emigrants to Texas."

Menzel's third intention was to his missionary efforts. German Catholics in Texas lacked the services of a priest who spoke their native tongue. It is known that he served the communities in Fredericksburg and New Braunfels and erected a huge cross at a hill near Fredericksburg that is still present today.

Menzel returned home to northern Bohemia in 1851 where he was recognized for his humanitarian endeavor and was promoted to the position of a dean. He spent time researching local nature and publishing books on the topics. His life's work was recognized by Austrian Emperor Franz Joseph I who decorated him with the Golden Cross for merit with Crown in 1875. Reverend Menzel died in Nové Město four years later on May 4, 1879.
